One Trillion Dollar Infrastructure Law Begins to Release Funds

ince the passage of the \$1 trillion infrastructure package, many federal agencies have started working to roll out these large investments and funding opportunities. This process will take many more months. However, funding announcements have already started for energy programs and large transportation capital projects. The state of Maryland is expected to receive \$284,000,000,000 over the next five fiscal years. Much of this funding will be going to roads, bridges, and railways. On top of that there is a significant amount of funding for rural broadband. cybersecurity, and electric grid investments. Gov. Larry

der, established a subcabinet on infrastructure with the sole purpose of administering funds and advising on the implementation of these funding programs.

This historic amount of funding mirrors the very same investment Congress passed in 1936 with the Rural Electrification Act. The passage of this infrastructure package shows that bipartisanship exists on Capitol Hill when the time comes to invest in aging infrastructure and new technology.

Through good communication and advocacy, electric cooperatives and their members can benefit from this type of investment once again.

We know members of our community have different needs and perspectives, and we welcome diverse views on all issues under consideration by the Co-op. The more viewpoints we hear, the better we are able to reflect the needs of all corners of our community.

INCLUSION

While our top priority is providing safe, reliable and affordable energy, we also want to be a catalyst for good in our community. Because we are your local electric cooperative, our revenues stay right here in our community. In turn, we invest in our diverse community base through scholarship programs, charitable giving, educational programs, and our Choptank Electric Trust. 'Playing' it Forward and Making a Difference

a long-standing presence in the Centreville area for over 100 years. Originally two parishes, they combined in 1959 to become one location that it is today. With a community hall, church, and playground area, there is much to see at their campus. The church also runs many additional programs for the community such as Sunday school and Vacation Bible school during the summer, in addition to supplying this open playground for the community.

"Being a safe place for families and children here in our community is why we are here," said Rev. Karen Handy, Pastor of the Centreville United Methodist Church, when asked about their community and recent update to their playground. "This playground is used by more than just our parishioners. Members of the community

come weekly and bring their children to play, have picnics, and just enjoy themselves. We knew that this playground was important not only to our church members, but many others."

The playground that is included in their campus has been a community staple for over 30 years. The original playground, a set of wooden structures, was becoming unsafe and beyond repair. "Over the years, we have had Boy Scout troops come fix parts of it for their Eagle Scout project, but in 2020, our Board of Trustees decided that it was time to replace the playground with new, safer equipment that was friendly for all ages and disabilities," said Handy.

When it was decided, the community pulled together to help the church with this new project. Downes Lawn Care, a local business and parish-

ioner of the church, donated their time first to demolishing the old playground so that they could begin construction.

After that was completed, they began raising funds to prep the ground and place new equipment on site. With the help from many community businesses, they began raising funds. Handy and a parishioner both remembered that the Choptank Electric Trust could be a place to look for funding, and they applied in Sept 2021.

Seeing the need immediately, the Choptank Electric Trust jumped at the opportunity to support this community investment. "This type of work is vital for a flourishing community," said Donna Landis-Smith, Queen Anne's County's representative on the Choptank Electric Trust Board. "Supporting the community as a whole

is how the Choptank Electric Trust wants to concentrate their funding."

Donating \$2,500 toward the cost of the playground in October 2021, and with the help of many other community businesses and private donations, they were able to build the playground and dedicate it on October 24, 2021.

"When we reached out to the community and asked for their help, there was no hesitation. Everyone wanted to be involved, and the Choptank Electric Trust board was another partnership that we were happy to make to complete this project," said Handy.

While the church is still working on minor additions to the playground like adding a bench, some other playground items, and sprucing up a few picnic tables, they are looking forward to utilizing this playground for many years to come.

"This spring, we are looking to stage our Easter egg hunt for the children," said Handy. "But we are already looking at additional programs that we can develop for the community as well. We are hoping to start a story time of sorts. We would invite the community to come read a fun book with us, and then they could play on the playground after it was over."

WHAT IS ONE STORY ABOUT YOUR LIFE THAT CAN HELP PEOPLE REMEMBER YOU?

My family and I formed a scholarship in 1991 in memory of my cousins B. Timothy and Shawn T. Heaney, brothers who both died tragically. Tim was killed by the Long Island Sniper and Shawn was lost at sea in Alaska. Then their brother Kerry passed away suddenly a few years ago. Our family has given over \$200,000 away to over 300 students who graduated from Greenport High School in my hometown, Greenport N.Y. I am the chairperson of the scholarship committee.

Notice to Members of Revised Power Cost Adjustment

hoptank Electric Cooperative members will see an increase in the cost of power supply starting with May 1, 2022, billing. This will be reflected in the Power Cost

Adjustment (PCA), which will change from a credit of \$.00072/kilowatthour to a charge of \$.01388/kWh. The monthly bill of a residential member who uses 1,000 kWh per

month will be increased by \$14.60. This adjustment reflects an increase of wholesale power cost from our generation and transmission supplier, Old Dominion Electric Cooperative.
