Trust donates to Fishmobile for educational renovations

ducating and engaging minds about the Chesapeake Bay's ecosystem and its inhabitants is the sole purpose of the Phillips Wharf Environmental Center. Located in Talbot County. their Fishmobile, which runs from April through November, is at the center of their educational programs. The traveling exhibit has seen just about everything from formal garden parties and private events, school functions, and fairs. Since COVID began there was some down time. "COVID hurt our outreach programs, so we used this opportunity to our advantage," said Kristen Lycett, Ph.D. and Executive Director of the Phillips Wharf Environmental Center. "While the bus was sitting unused, we wanted to redesign the exhibits and get the

bus back into working order."

Redesigning and updating displays is time-consuming and costly, so Lycett looked to the Operation Round Up program and the Choptank Electric Trust Board to aid them. "We're so thankful for the donation and the opportunity to touch more people's lives," said Lycett. "With this funding, we were able to update most of our exhibits and pay for some necessary repairs to the bus."

The Fishmobile is dedicated to showing people what underwater life is like in the Chesapeake Bay and helping people feel more connected to the aquatic environment. With the grant money provided by the Trust, they were able to update their shadow box displays that enclose

fossils found locally, updated their hands on bins that give guests the opportunity to touch and feel real fossils, added a "Trash in the Bay" display, salinity display, and updated their water tanks that house many seasonal creatures also found in the bay. Mechanical problems with the bus were also repaired.

With their displays updated and the bus back up and running, the Center is looking forward to being back on the road once more. The educational aspect of the Fishmobile is multifaceted. History of the bay and the region, how our daily activities affect wildlife, and the interactive tanks all create an immersive learning experience.

"One of the great things about the Fishmobile is it brings the

Chesapeake Bay onto land so we can share that with our guests. They may have only seen these animals in a specific setting or haven't spent much time on the water in general and, therefore, haven't had much interaction with these animals or the environment." said Lycett. "We allow people to experience animals in a more natural setting and see them in the water, interact with them. It's amazing to see the faces of our guests light up in wonder."

"This service is near and dear to many in the community," said Mike Boyle, representative for Talbot County on the Choptank Electric Trust Board. "And being able to reenergize its displays means better education for future generations,

and for our adult community members as well."

Tips for a Safe

Harvest season brings hard work and can be EXHAUSTING but rushing the job to save time can be extremely. dangerous (even deadly!) when working near overhead power lines. We urge farm operators and workers to keep the following safety tips in mind:

Use care when operating large machinery near power lines.

Inspect the height of equipment to determine clearance.

Always keep equipment at least 10 feet away (in all directions) from power lines.

Remember to lower extensions /!\ when moving loads.

> If a power line is sagging or looks to be dangerously low, please call us immediately.



ur cooperative is made up of 55,000+ members; we all rely on the safety and up keep of our power grid. Our power lines and utility poles are the foundation of how we all enjoy the comforts, convenience and the power of reliable electricity and quality internet. An increasing, and unfortunate, issue that's occurring is our power lines being shot by hunters and gun enthusiasts.

We know the majority of hunters practice safe hunting and they understand the potential hazards when discharging a firearm. We encourage these experienced hunters who are familiar with the area to help identify locations of electrical equipment to the younger,

less-experienced hunters and gun enthusiasts. Tampering or misuse of our fiber and electric lines can not only put you in danger but will also affect all other members that are down-line. Just one fiber line damaged by a shot can have a repair cost of \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Manager of Government Affairs, Matt Teffeau addressed the Maryland Wildlife Advisory Commission during their May meeting. BASIC ELECTRICAL HUNTER SAFETY RULES TO FOLLOW

1	Be aware and take note of your surroundings.	8
2	Do not shoot at or near power lines, fiber lines or electrical equipment.	
3	Familiarize yourself with the location of power lines and equipment on land where you shoot/hunt.	9
4	Do not shoot at, or near, birds perching on utility lines with any type of firearm, including pistols, rifles, shotguns or bows.	10
5	Take notice of warning signs and keep clear of electrical equipment.	
6	Keep a safe distance from power lines and electrical equipment when hunting. Accidents can be easily avoided if you do so.	11
7	Be especially careful in wooded areas where power lines may not be as visible.	:

safety education classes about the Don't Shoot the Lines campaign was made by members of the Commission," Teffeau said.

Maryland law has several provisions that prohibit hunters from damaging the property of another. Please be advised that if you or hunters you allow on your property cause damage to Choptank's equipment, you could be fined by the Department of Natural Resources and/or held liable for the cost of repairs.

Please respect yourself, your fellow members and our power infrastructure. Thank you for being a valuable member of Choptank Electric Cooperative; please find helpful safety tips below.

Damage to the conductor can happen, possibly dropping a phase on the ground. If it's dry and the electricity goes to the ground, there is the possibility of electrocution and fire.

Never use utility poles or towers to support equipment used in your shooting activity.

Never climb poles or place deer stands on utility poles. Energized lines and equipment on the poles can conduct electricity to anyone who comes in contact with them, causing shock or electrocution.

Do not place decoys or any other hunting / shooting equipment on power lines or other utility equipment. Anything attached to a pole besides utility equipment can pose an obstruction, and a serious hazard, to electric cooperative employees as they perform utility operations.
